
# TAD-SC NEW SUBSCRIPTION AND MAILING MANAGER



# DEAF BUSINESSMAN OPENS RESTAURANT IN TEXAS

David Myers is the son of a businessman with inherited entrepreneurship and farming in his blood. Growing up in the midst of both wholesale meat and a farming operation, he followed his father and learned along the way.



When Myers reached college age, he went to Gallaudet and majored in business. While there Myer met Dr. Boyce Williams, the great deaf

leader who became his mentor and friend and led him to a career in rehabilitation services. Myers has served the deaf population for 45 years in North Carolina, Indiana, Ohio, Louisiana, Michigan, Washington, DC, and Texas. As early as 1993, Myers and his son were discussing starting a business with an eye at a Gulf Coast location.

### Partnered up with Son

Edwin Myers, David's son is a CODA, and an interpreter who has always intertained the idea of a restaurant business. After many discussions with his father, and considering several investment possiblilities, the father-son team, finally in 2002, made a purchase offer on a building in Port Aransas, an island near Corpus Christi, Texas, which fell through when the seller would not correct some serious defects. Then in 2004, a purchase was made, also on the island, but a different building. This building had previously housed a bar and a grill called Kodys, which the father-son team decided to retain for their business name. After a lot of discussions, set backs, discouragement, planning, hassles building over code requirements, etc., the restaurant was opened in January, 2009.

### A Leap of Faith

Opening a restaurant is a leap of faith for any aspiring owner, as restaurants have the highest failure rate of all business. David Myers said, "Being in the midst of the worst economy of my lifetime, and without any advertising, it was downright scary." A new president of the USA was taking office in the same month, and many businesses were bailing out.

To David and his son's surprise, the start-up was a blazing success, even without any advertising. The establishment is a seafood restaurant with walk-up food service and also a putt-putt golf course on the lot. Myers is not sure of the reasons for the restaurant's success, but states "for whatever the reasons, we had been so long in getting the building ready, getting the putt-putt course set up, and all else that comes with opening a restaurant, that when we finally opened, our first customers were curiosity seekers and 'locals' as the people who are permanent residents on the island are called who had watched our slow progress."

### Saw Growth With Small Advertising Budget

The goal all along was good food, good service, reasonable prices and a comfortable and friendly environment. The father-son team has accomplished this goal. The business has grown in five short months, dramatically, and without advertising except for one ad in a monthly magazine serving the Corpus Christi area, which is far enough away for word of mouth to not be a very effective advertising medium.

David Myers is not directly involved in the management of the business. He credits his son, Edwin and his wife, Amy Ramsey Myers also a CODA and an interpreter, who manage the day to day operations of the business and they have been nothing but successful. Dave Hix is the Chef at Kodys.

The restaurant also has 18 employees. In addition, David Myers is a public servant — Director of the Texas Office for Deaf and Hard of Hearing Services under the Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services in Austin. "This deaf involvement naturally translates (Kodys) into a deaf-friendly environment and attracts deaf customers," Myers said.




Donald J. Sowell, 77, of San Marcos, Texas



passed away on Friday, August 7, 2009. He spent his last five years living at the La Vista Retirement Community He was born in Austin, Texas on October 1931. 16, He graduated TSD in

1950. He was preceded in death by his parents, D.B. and Lillie Sowell, his sister Mary Ellene (Sowell) Cunningham and her husband Charles Cunningham, and his brother Thomas Sowell. He is survived by his four nephews, 11 great nieces and nephews and twenty-two great great nieces and nephews. Buried followed in Austin Memorial Park.

Howell Wright Templeton, 87, of San Antonio,



Texas passed away on Tuesday, August 4, 2009. He was born in Ft. Worth, Texas on March 3, 1922 and lived most of his life in San Antonio. His parents Howard Johnston and Myrtle Wright Templeton preceded him in death.

Survivors include his brother James H. Templeton and wife Lillian of Austin, cousins, nephew and niece. Howard was injured at Birth and was stone deaf all of his life. Howard attended Texas School for the Deaf in Austin from 1933 until January 1943. In January 1943, Howard and 11 other boys from TSD were sent to Dallas for training and work at North

American Aviation. Howard helped to build P51 "Mustand" fighter planes until World War II ended in August of 1945. Howard was very mechanically inclinded and worked off and on in several "fix it shops" repairing small appliances and clocks. Howard was seriously injured when hit by an ambulance at the corner of St. Mary's and Travis Street in San Antonio. Being deaf, he could not hear the ambulance coming when he stepped out in front of a stopped bus. Howard worked for almost 30 years as handyman at Blanco road car wash for his dear friend, Harry Oliver. Howard helped to keep the mechanical equipment operating smoothly at the car wash. In September of 2005, Howard suffered a stroke which paralyzed his left arm and leg. He has been a resident of Northgate Health and Rehabilitation center since that time. Howard will always be remembered as a kind, gentle, caring and helpful brother, friend and neighbor services. Burial Park South. (Published in Express-News on August 7, 2009)

# RECIPE PIZZA HOT DISH



(Glenn's favorite recipe from Taste of Home)

2 eggs

1/2 cup milk

1 package (7 ounces) elbow macaroni, cooked and drained

1 pound ground beef

1 medium onion, chopped

1 can (10-3/4 ounces) condensed tomato soup, undiluted

1 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1/2 teaspoon dried basil

1/2 teaspoon dried oregano

2 cups (8 ounces) shredded cheddar cheese

### YIELD: 12-16 servings.

- 1. In a small bowl, beat eggs. Add milk and macaroni. Pour into a greased 13-in. x 9-in. baking dish; set aside.
- 2. In a large skillet, cook beef and onion until meat is no longer pink; drain. Stir in the soup and seasonings.
- 3. Spoon over macaroni. Sprinkle cheese over all. Bake uncovered, at 350 for 20-25 minutes.
