

The second Texas capitol was built in 1853



While Austin was going on its way, busily building and making up for lost time during the war years, the state government was still in the throes of Reconstruction. The culmination of the bitterness was in the "Coke-Davis embroglio" when it looked for a short time as though Texas might have two governors. A year later the capitol was again thronged, this time for the burial of former Governor A.J. Hamilton, on April 12, 1875. The terraces had been added with the intention of beautifying the capitol grounds. (Austin History Library)



The second Texas capitol was built in 1853, on the same site as the present capitol in Austin. It was destroyed in the great capitol fire at noon on November 9, 1881. The capitol took fire and in two hours despite the work of the fire department and other volunteers, "nothing was left of it but the bare bones. The old building however was filled with many reminiscenses and thousands of bats, all of which perished in the flames.


## Since 1999, Six Flags Fiesta Texas has been participating in helping the deaf and hard of hearing during Deaf Awareness Day, on June 6, 2015

#### A Brief History of the Building

The building was built in 1913 by German immigrant C.H. Schmidt. He came from Germany in 1890 and married Miss Anna Schulze in 1891 and built their first store. Mr. Schmidt started as a shoemaker, and his wife baked cookies to sell in the store, along with sardines and sauerkraut in barrels. They bought produce and poultry from the local farmers and shipped them to Houston for resale. They eventually outgrew two buildings, before they established the present building, which allowed them to start purchasing sugar, flour, coffee, seed fertilizer, and grain that was delivered by the carloads by the trains.





**Elisabet Ney Museum** 

The Elisabet Ney Museum is the former studio and portrait collection created by 19th century sculptor Elisabet Ney. The museum offers a range of educational programs, exhibits, special events, workshops and lectures throughout the year. In 1892, European portrait sculptress Elisabet Ney (1833-1907) purchased property in Austin, established a studio named Formosa and resumed her career as a noted sculptor of notables.

Ney sculpted legendary Texans, among them Stephen F. Austin and Sam Houston. Ney also assembled at her American studio portraits of European notables, including King Ludwig II of Bavaria, Otto von Bismarck, Arthur Schopenhauer and Jacob Grimm rendered from life as a young artist in Europe.



#### RECIPE

Sunrise Breakfast Casserole
By Juanita Byrd

2 pkgs (12 ounces each Johnsonille Breakfast sausage links 9 eggs

3 cups milk

1 1/2 t. ground mustard

1 t. salt

½ t. pepper

1 package Ore-lds Frozen Potato "Shredded hash brown" thawed.

2 cups (8 ounces shredded 4-cheese Mexican blend cheese.

½ cups diced red bell peppers

1/3 c thinly sliced green onions

Salsa or Picante sauce

Arrange sausage links on an ungreased 15-in x 10in x 1 in baking pan.

Bake at 375 F for 15-20 minutes, turning links once or until sausage is cooked through and lightly browned, drained. Allow to cool slightly, slice sausage into ¼-inch coins in a large bowl, whisk eggs, milk and seasonings, Add sausage, hash brown, cheese, bell pepper and green onions. Pour into a greased. 13x9-2in baking dish. Cover and refrigerate overnight.

Remove from refrigerate 30 minutes before baking. Bake uncovered at 350 F for 65-70 minutes or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Let stand 10 minutes before serving. Serve with salsa or picante sauce.


