NATION DEAFDIGEST: TEXAS TEEN KILLED WHILE CROSSING STREET

A deaf Texas teen lost his life in a tragic car crash Sunday night, January 6, said CBS 7. James Dale Haney, 18, was carrying a bicycle and crossing West County Road when he was hit by a truck. Haney, who was profoundly deaf, died in the hospital a few hours later. An account has been set up at a local credit union to help the family.

A NOTICEABLE CEMETERY GRAVE

Cemeteries have their own graves whose shape and design stand out among others on the same grounds.

At the Sunnyside Cemetery in Long Beach, CA, one such monument stands out. It is the grave of Dr. Albert Rhea who was buried in 1907.

Rhea was a late deafened physician who was hit by a street car and was instantly killed. Being deaf he was not able to hear and move out of the way of the incoming vehicle.

Not sure if there were other cemeteries whose highly visible monuments were erected to honor the deaf.






James Levoy Sorenson, founder of Sorenson Video Relay Service and Utah's richest man (\$4.5 Billion, said Forbes), died Sunday prostate cancer at the age of 86. When Sorenson founded Sorenson **VRS** in 2003, he

"revolutionized the way the deaf communicate," colleague Dave Johnson told The Salt Lake Tribune. The following year, Sorenson developed a relationship with Gallaudet University through his son, James Lee Sorenson, a member of the school's Board of Associates. The elder Sorenson went on to make one of the largest donations in school history, a \$5

million gift for the James Lee Sorenson Language and Communication Center (SLCC). According to a GU's Daily Digest, Sorenson made his last visit to the campus in April, 2007 for the SLCC groundbreaking ceremony.

RECIPE

NUTTY CHOCOLATE FUDGE

By Eileen (Kennedy) Brookes

Prep Time: 15 min. Cook Time: 10 min.

- 1 can (5oz.) evaporated milk
- 1 ½ cups sugar
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 pkg. (12 oz.) Nestle semi-sweet chocolate morsels.
- ½ cup pecan pieces
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1. Heavily spray an 8-inch square pan with non-stick cooking spray and set aside.
- 2. Combine milk, sugar and salt in heavy saucepan over medium heat, stirring constantly, until it boils. Reduce heat to medium-low and cook for 5 minutes, stirring constantly.
- 3. Remove saucepan from heat and add chocolate morsels, pecan pieces and vanilla. Stir the fudge slowly with a spoon until chocolate morsels have completely melted.
- 4. Spread the fudge into prepare square pan. Allow the fudge in a container and use plastic wrap or foil to separate the layers. Make 24 fudge squares.
