FIRE SAFETY

Some batteries don't even last that long. There was a conversation about smoke detectors for the deaf. 

Germany's Sixty-four (64) Pre-World War II Schools for the Deaf Reduced To Only Nine

Copied from TSD Lone Star – March 15, 1949)

Germany had before the war sixty four (64) schools for deaf children. Today only nine (9) schools are continuing their work as before the war. Some of the plants were requisitioned to house displaced persons, but most of these plants were destroyed in the bombardments. Even more grave is the fact that there are no more teachers wishing to learn how to train deaf children. The older teachers have retired, some are still prisoners in Russia, and others perished at the front. In the schools which remain, the question of how to feed and clothe the children is a daily problem; nevertheless, they do not lose hope. The orally educated deaf had a home for their aged at Stuttgart. This was destroyed in the bombardments but is now being rebuilt. The funds were found by a miracle. The authorities pushed the formalities, and the new home, which will shelter sixty persons, will be larger and better than the old one. There is in Stuttgart a club of deaf athletes, recognized in 1946, which has at present over a thousand members. They play football, handball, light sports, swim, do mountain climbing and play chess. This rebirth of courage in a country so impoverished by war is a splendid thing.-(From the French of Le Messaager, Lausanne, Switzerland).

Another ceremony will be held at the Iowa School for the Deaf in the spring.


John Calvin "JC" Morris

Recipe

The Neiman Marcus Chocolate Chip Cookies

By Eileen Brookes

½ cup unsalted butter, softened

1 cup brown sugar

3 tablespoons granulated sugar

1 egg

2 teaspoons vanilla

½ teaspoon baking soda

½ teaspoon baking powder

½ teaspoon salt

1 % cups flour

1 ½ teaspoons instant expresso powder, lightly crushed

8 ounces semisweet chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Grease a large cookie sheet.

In a large bowl, combine butter and sugars. Use an electric mixer, beat until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla.

In a medium bowl, combine baking soda, baking powder, salt, flour and expresso powder. Stir to mix and add to butter mixture, using a spatula or wooden spoon to combine ingredients. Stir in chocolate chips.

Drop dough by rounded tablespoons (or more) onto prepared cookie sheet several inches apart. Bake 8 to 10 minutes for soft cookies or 10 to 12 minutes for crisp cookies. Make 15 large cookies.




